PINE HILL ESTATES

Pine Hill Estates is the most recent acquisition of the North Haven Land Trust, having been acquired from Pine Hill Estates, LLC & Louis D'Amato in April, 2008. The property is located at the corner of North Hill Road and Beach Lane. Much of the 11.40 acre

Much of the 11.40 acre property is wetlands, but it is generously spotted with white and red oak trees, red maples, silver beech, eastern white cedars, a few yellow poplars and plenty of milkweed. This wetland feature makes this a very inviting habitat for birds, butterflies and other species of wildlife.

Another interesting feature of this property is its proximity to 20 plus acres of open space at nearby Sugar Hill Road owned by the homeowners association. This provides over 30 acres of protected space between these two contiguous properties.

THE SEAL OF THE NORTH HAVEN LAND TRUST



The Seal of the North Haven Land Trust depicts the Snowy Owl, a bird whose normal habitat is the Arctic Tundra. During the winter of 1971-1972, one made a temporary home in the Quinnipiac marsh, where it was seen and photographed by many people near Sackett Point Road.

The arrival of the Snowy Owl happened to coincide with the organization of the North Haven Land Trust which was officially incorporated in September of 1972.

It seemed only natural that the Snowy Owl should be adopted as the symbol of the Land Trust. This seal has become symbolic of the North Haven Land Trust, whose primary purpose is to preserve land in its natural state, both as a refuge for wildlife and as a resource for the education and enjoyment of the people of North Haven.

The North Haven Land Trust is a non-profit corporation dedicated to acquiring and preserving open space in our town. The NHLT accepts donations of land, conservation easements or money to purchase land.

The more than 125 land trusts in Connecticut have acquired and preserved more than 22,000 acres of land. Through the Connecticut Land Conservation Council the NHLT works closely with The Nature Conservancy and other environmental organizations. It is independent of town government but cooperates with the North Haven Conservation Commission and town officials to achieve common goals. The Board of Directors, officers and members are your neighbors who have joined together to save some of our streams, ponds, woodlands and marshes.
